FROM DEBI'S DESK

Comments from the President of Canterbury Court

One of my favorite TED Talks is *Simon Sinek's* "How Great Leaders Inspire Action." The talk highlights concepts from his book, *Start with the Why*, and focuses on great leaders inspiring action by explaining **WHY** an organization does what it does.

Last month in our quarterly town hall, Peggy Heinisch asked a very important question – "WHY are we embarking on the Enrichment Project?" Given the number of nodding heads I saw on the zoom screen, it was clear that we need to take a step back and spend more time communicating **why** we are moving forward with this massive undertaking and **why** this project is necessary for Canterbury's future success.

Founded by All Saints' and St. Luke's Episcopal Churches, Canterbury Court opened in 1965 as Atlanta's *first* Life Plan Community pioneering a wide range of independent living options plus a continuum of care that would evolve to include personal care and skilled nursing all on one campus.

The Enrichment Project began in 2016 as part of a strategic planning process initiated by the Board of Trustees and led by Senior Management with input from residents, industry experts and staff. As part of that process, Canterbury engaged healthcare consulting firm **Leaderstat** to conduct focus groups with residents regarding short and long term goals. The results of those conversations revealed that residents feel strongly about 1) enhancing memory care support throughout the community, with a focus on creating secure accomodations for those with later stages of dementia, and 2) creating private accomodations in the skilled nursing home as opposed to shared rooms and bathrooms. Additionally, the rapidly growing demographic of older adults in Atlanta as well as the increasing number of individuals affected by dementia has created a surge in development by for-profit providers providing luxury Assisted Living apartments and Memory Care support, leaving Canterbury lagging behind in the competitive landscape.


Through a 24 month planning process, a Master Plan evolved to improve the quality of life for our current residents, attract future residents, and ensure the future stability of Canterbury Court. The plan addressed resident needs identified in the focus groups and addressed the preferences of future residents for larger Assisted Living licensed apartments with kitchens and laundry as well as dedicated Memory Care support.

The Enrichment Project will create a brand new healthcare center located on adjacent land towards Club Drive. This new healthcare center will feature 42 one and two-bedroom assisted living licensed apartments that are larger and more home-like than our current personal care apartments, an additional 21 assisted living licensed apartments that will be part of a new dedicated memory care neighborhood that will include almost 14,000 SF of therapeutic memory care gardens, and 40 private skilled nursing apartments with private bathrooms. The project will also add 105 new inde-

pendent living apartments with the addition of the Garden Tower and the Verandas (7 garden level apartments with private terraces on the first floor of the new healthcare building) plus 28 additional independent living apartments that will be converted from our existing healthcare floors. These new apartments are necessary to bring in additional entrance fees and monthly service fees to support the cost of building the new healthcare center. Additionally, the project will include a new dining venue with a 7,000 SF outdoor amenity deck, along with renovations to common areas including the dining rooms, main entrance, and wellness center.

So, to return to Peggy's very important question, Canterbury is embarking on the Enrichment Project to ensure that we continue to be the pioneering community our Founders envisioned, one that provides a joyous lifestyle for older adults with a continuum of care to meet their **changing needs**. Over the last six decades, Canterbury has developed a reputation of excellence built on engaged residents, valued associates, and a person-centered approach to care. Through this project, Canterbury has the opportunity to once again play a critical role in shaping the landscape for what aging can look like in our community and to evolve alongside the shifting demographic of Metro Atlanta.

I found out I was pregnant about a week before COVID came to town, which certainly had its effect on my experience of pregnancy. For starters, my husband was not permitted to join me for any of my medical appointments. He missed out on the meeting of doctors, the asking of questions, the viewing of sonograms, and the going out to lunch afterwards to process it all. Going out to lunch? What is that anymore?

Instead of browsing around stores, touching baby clothes and testing equipment, I ordered all my baby supplies online. For me, online shopping leads to too many choices, hours wasted comparing options, reading reviews, and selfinduced headaches. It also has a way of making me feel disconnected from the physical world, something that is good to feel grounded in. I had a virtual baby shower on zoom with girlfriends, which while it did allow for my out-of-town friends. But I believe, as our mission statement to participate, did not allow for those much mentions, that our lives are woven togethneeded hugs, hand squeezes and that knowing/comforting eye contact amongst women that is so needed in preparation for all of this baby stuff.

However, here at Canterbury, I was surrounded by caring co-workers who constantly checked in to see how I was doing. I was made to feel safe and understood by if you are concerned about a friend or

You have the power to brighten someone's day by checking in on them, making them feel safe and looked after, asking if there is anything you can do to help or just providing it, no questions asked. ACCUMULATION SALE



has helped by introducing other dealers to our sale and coordinating our arrangement with the auction house. She has also been one of our biggest customers, spending more than \$1,000 at Canterbury every year.

This is a win-win for both of us since she is able to get more money than we would with our clientele and also make some money for herself. We will continue this to see how it works but I am happy to have an outlet for special items of value.

As you are reading this, we will be nearing our preparation for our scaled-back **fall sale on November 5**. The sale will go from 11 am to 2 pm. We encourage residents to come in the 11:00 to 12:30 timeframe. From 12:30 to 2:00 we will allow residents to invite family and friends to shop. There are photos of old men with their shotguns, standing by to protect their families, and I got to wondering how we would react today if our TV program was interrupted by a similar announcement. We did have a smaller-scale scare announcement, a few years ago when local talk-show host Neil Boortz announced on WRNG radio that Navy-trained Dolphins had jumped aboard a fishing boat off San Diego and had swept the crew overboard.

I know that Halloween is over, but I just had to include these vents to get you talking about what you remember — it's quite a surprise to discover what memories you still have locked up in your brain. Why not try a few more brain exercises such as where were you on VE day? What were the happiest days of your life? What was your first car and where did you travel with it?

We have the latitude to make choices in life. We can choose to act or feel a certain way at any given moment, meanwhile some things are out of our control. No one goes through life making all the right decisions; we can learn and

grow from them, good or bad. Sometimes, life can be hard, and how we cope with life's difficulties can go a long way in determining how our story will be told.

The coronavirus pandemic has changed a lot of things, but one thing that hasn't changed is that falling is not a part of normal aging. It can have serious consequences for those who don't act to reduce the risk. Some individuals will isolate themselves due to a fall or fear of falling which makes matters worse physically and mentally. This can be changed by deciding to take matters into your own hands.

There are many conditions that can lead to a fall. The CDC lists the following: lower leg weakness, difficulties with gait and balance, foot pain and poor foot wear, use of medications, and some over-the-counter medications can affect balance and how steady you are on your feet, vision problems, and home hazards and dangers. Most of the time, falls occur due to a combination of these risk factors. The more that you have, the greater the chances of falling. The Canterbury Team can address these risks!

You can prevent falls from happening by simply reaching out to us or your doctor to

evaluate your risks. You should ask your doctor or pharmacist to review your medicines to see if any make you dizzy or sleepy and ask about Vitamin D supplements and calcium. If you have a fall, don't be afraid to report it even if you were not injured! Remember, if you have fallen once, your chances double and the second one could be debilitating.

You have our Medical Director, Dr. Bryan Hooker, Genesis Rehabilitation, and Wellness Programming located a few minutes away from your apartment. We will work together to provide an action plan to address strength, balance, and gait. There are resources in the Wellness Center where you can use both land and water exercises on a weekly basis to maintain your independence and steady feet.

All of us fall at one time or another, and they can be serious. However, those that address the reasons for falling by being proactive, determined, and disciplined can have successful outcomes. You can live with fear of falling, or you can take charge of the situation to live your life to the fullest. You have a choice. Let's make it a good one!

In honor of Veteran's Day, **Dr. Paul Levengood** will present an illustrated lecture, *George C. Marshall: Leader of Men.* Dr. Levengood is president of the George C. Marshall Foundation in Lexington, Virginia.

George C. Marshall was one of the towering figures of the twentieth century, a man described as having won the war- for his role as architect of Allied victory in WWII- and won the peacefor his role as rebuilder of Europe through the Marshall Plan. But what about this quiet, unassuming man allowed him to accomplish such great deeds?

In short, George C. Marshall was an instinctive judge of talent and a conscientious leader of men. From the circle of general officers nicknamed "Marshall's Men" whom he trained and trusted with command, to the humble G.I. in a foxhole, Marshall gave his subordinates what they wanted and needed. His story goes from the battlefields of Europe to the halls of Washington and touches on every significant figure of the 1940s and 50s.
